Canterbury Update (Year 3)



On Wednesday 25th June Year 3 were transported back in time to Ancient Greece. We began the day being greeted by Adam, our Greek warrior for the day! We started by considering how Ancient Greek soldiers were prepared for battle. We were fascinated at the different armour, the helmet and the shields. We thought it was funny to watch Mrs Bell get dressed up and show she was the stronger warrior with her shield!

Following this, we were told the story of the King of Persia who wanted to attack Greece and take all the cities for himself. He claimed all he wanted in return for peace was earth and water. In those days this meant that if you were given this gift you were accepted as the leader. As a class of Athenians, we voted to reject the offer from the Persian king. It was decided that all the city states of Greece would help to defeat the Persians. We split our class into two armies – the Persians and the Greeks – an epic battle commenced as we retold the rest of the story. The Ancient Greeks won!

Next, we had another important Job as Athenians – we became members of the government. We had decisions to make as a group of people to make Athens great and one of the best city states. Using democracy, we voted on many decisions such as: who we should build a temple in dedication too; should we go to war with Sparta and which god should we follow. We emersed ourselves into this role and took it very seriously, all the grown-ups were really impressed with our reasoning.

After lunch, we looked at Ancient Greek writing. Using papyrus, wooden pens and ink we used the Greek alphabet to be able to write a simple sentence. We found this really good fun but quite tricky to match up the letters and the sounds. We all did a fantastic job. Finally, we played two games – 5 lines and Latrunculi. These were quite strategic games for us to play – working in pairs we had to try to defeat our opponents. We were very successful

Overall, we had a brilliant day and we enjoyed all the different activities. The day really embedded our understanding of Ancient Greece.











Salisbury Update (Year 4)



Year 4 have been incredibly busy during Term 6.. Recently, we visited the Energy from waste Centre in Lincoln, a trip that chimed with our school vision beautifully in terms of 'being positive participants in the world community.'

The class were fascinated to learn how their household rubbish can be recycled and turned into energy to heat and light their homes. Alongside this, the children learnt about the carbon footprint involved in the making of some simple toys and discussed whether all the energy involved was worth it. In another workshop, they talked about the use of excess packaging, how much of it was recyclable and the eventual cost to the environment. They then had a go at redesigning packaging for several children's toys. The day culminated in the weighing of the class's lunch box rubbish. Watch out for news on how we did later in the term!

Last week, Salisbury class joined children from other schools to participate in the Church School's Festival at St Deny's Church, Sleaford. The day was spent taking part in workshops that included: learning about St Deny, brass rubbings, learning the Lord's Prayer using sign language, observational drawing of the church interior and discussing how different cultures depict Christ through artwork. The children enjoyed a picnic lunch and the day rounded off with the children taking part in collective worship. Again, this trip linked to our vision in respect of showcasing their talents, to be their very best through love and service.

Changes to school entrance and exit

Our building work has now completed, barring a few items of extra work to take place in the summer holidays. Entrance

Year 4 - via side green gates (along with Year 5 and 6)

Exit

Year 4 - via side green gates (along with Year 5 and 6)

Parents and carers that use the Wraparound Care facility would have received communication from Andrew's Angels as to the changes for drop off and collections. This will now be via the green gates - the brown side gates will now be locked before and after school.

Attendance


A reminder that our attendance policy can be found on our school website, under the policies section (or by clicking <u>here</u>).

Government policy on attendance changed in August 2024, as outlined via the letter sent to all parents at the end of last academic year (please click <u>here</u> for a copy of this letter).

The Department for Education (DfE) emphasises that term-time holiday should be avoided. Absence during this time can significantly impact your child's education (see graphic below for more details). We kindly request that you plan holidays during breaks to minimise disruption in learning. Any such absences will be recorded as an unauthorised absence.

If you believe there are exceptional circumstances that require a term-time holiday, please submit a written request to the school as soon as possible. We will assess each case individually and provide guidance accordingly. However, if we determine that the circumstances do not qualify as exceptional, we will notify you in writing, indicating that you may be subject to a penalty notice issued by the local authority, which could result in legal action.


